Volunteers From Pacific Northern Rail Contractors (Railworks) and Southern Railway of BC (SRY) Look on as Surrey Councillor Judy Higginbotham Drives in “Golden” Spike on FVHRS Speeder Line.

Aug. 20. Volunteer crews from PNR and SRY showed up at the FVHRS car barn on Sept 20th, 2004 to begin laying track for the 600 ft circular speeder rail line.

All the equipment and track material was donated to the FVHRS by the two companies.

From early morning to the first big downpour of the summer, the volunteers worked, placing track, bending track and hammering in the spikes.

All the effort was to bring alive an idea of having an amusement RR put forward to the FVHRS Board of Directors after PNR had donated a crew speeder, along with a 10 passenger cart donated by SIRS.

As there will be a certain length of time between the time the first interurban arrives, is restored, and permission is granted to join up with, and operate, on SRY tracks there needs to be something to keep interest in the community high. A recreational RR seems to be the perfect plan.

The first attempt to operate the speeder on the new track took place on Oct. 10th. It was found that some more track work was required and once again PNR proved to be a fantastic community partner and volunteered to fix the problem.

Other volunteers and companies need to be recognized for their efforts: **Ken Breaks** for bulldozing, **Mid Valley Fencing** for a generous donation of labour. **Mainland Sand and Gravel** for 120 tonnes of track ballast. **Scotia Bank** for a \$2500.00 donation for ballast payment. **Coast Capital Credit Union** for a donation of \$5000.00.

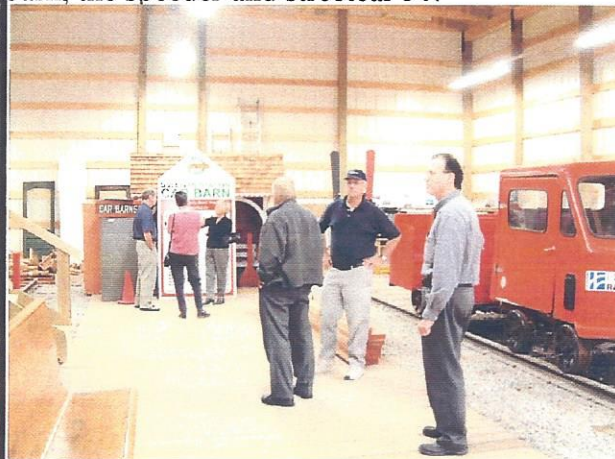

BCER 1304

It was 54 years ago this October that passenger service was discontinued on the Fraser Valley line of the BCER. As a result BCER 1304 was transferred to the Central Park Line. It remained in service until 1955 when it was sold to the New England Electric Railway Museum. Never reaching the east coast the car went to Oregon where it remains today.
