Sullivan Station Car Barn officially open

With a snip of the ribbon with over-sized scissors, Surrey Mayor Doug McCallum and Councillor Judy Higginbotham officially opened the Fraser Valley Heritage Railway Society's Sullivan Station Car Barn and Interpretive Centre on Saturday, September 13.

The 2,945 square foot facility was designed and built by the Lark Group of Cloverdale with additional work completed by companies listed below. (See "Donors...".)

The post and beam structure is finished in dark green metal cladding with red trim depicting FVHRS colours which are an amalgam of BCER's colours pre- and post-1924. It sits on a .5 acre lot which is being leased from the City for three years with a two year extension.

The car barn has two bays large enough to hold authentic BCER interurbans which the Society plans to acquire, restore and operate on the railway line, formerly called, "The Chilliwack Line" between Brownsville and Cloverdale.

"This is a major milestone in our Society's development," says Chair Robert Ashton. "With Surrey's and other donors' help, we are well on our way to getting tourism-oriented, heritage interurban service on track."





Clover Belle gets restoration make-over as Hampton Inn Hotels extend their "Save-A-Landmark" program to Surrey

The campaign to restore Streetcar 30, now called "Clover Belle" got a boost of \$10,000 U.S. from the Hampton Inn Hotels' "Explore the Highways with Hampton - Save-A-Landmark" program on Thursday, October 2 at the FVHRS car barn site.

In its first international extension of a four-year-old program designed to preserve historical, fun and unique roadside attractions throughout North America, Hampton - part of the Hilton Hotel Corporation - chose the 1912 Brill streetcar which the Society is leasing from its Victoria owners to run on a half-mile long streetcar line in Cloverdale. Credit for that selection goes to Hampton Inn & Suites - Langley General Manager Alnoor Tejpar who alerted the Cloverdale District Chamber of Commerce's Bill Reid and the Cloverdale Business Improvement Association's Paul Orazietti to his company's program. Reid and Orazietti persuaded the corporation to make the streetcar their first foreign extension of their program and produced the event assisted by the FVHRS.

Four executives from corporate headquarters in Memphis, Tennessee flew in to join 20 employees from Hampton Inns in Vancouver, Richmond, Surrey, Langley and Kamloops to clean and sand the 94-year-old heritage trolley.
