Replicated Sullivan Station officially opened

A part of Surrey's transportation heritage was revitalized on Saturday, June 5 with the official opening of the replicated Sullivan Station. The historically-authentic building was constructed during February and March and was painted in early May as a result of a Board decision to replicate the original 95-year-old Sullivan Station, which sits next to the Society's car barn

Addressing a crowd of 35, FVHRS Chair Robert Ashton revealed that the Society had made a down payment on BCER Interurban Car 1225, currently owned by the Orange Empire Railway Museum in Perris, California. Guest speakers included. Surrey Mayor Doug McCallum, Councillors Judy Higginbotham, Gary Tymoschuk, Penny Priddy, and, Delta North MLA Reni Masi. Special guest speakers were: Cal Ross from REFBC, which donated \$50,000 towards FVHRS' heritage preservation program; Bill Robson from Scotiabank, which donated \$4,000; and, Scott Baldwin from Polygon, which donated \$7,500.

A donation-in-kind came from the Lark Group. Construction was carried out by Brent Molver of Pidoca Construction with other services provided by Colwin Electrical Group, KK Quality Painting and Woodworks, The Hardwood Floor Company

BCER heritage railway storyboard unveiled at Sullivan

The history of the British Columbia Electric Railway in Surrey has been commemorated with the unveiling of a heritage storyboard near the site of the old Sullivan Station just south of the Fraser Valley Line at 152nd Street and 64th Avenue.

The storyboard unveiling was part of Heritage Week, February 16-22, and was prepared by FVHRS Member s Henry Ewert and Graham MacDonell in conjunction with Surrey Heritage Services which acknowledged the efforts of the Society in promoting the history of the BCER in Surrey and the Fraser Valley. The unveiling followed a storyboard dedication at the Sullivan Community Hall to appreciate the Sullivan Community Association's efforts in promoting the history of Sullivan.
