15 years and what have we done so far?

While the society is 15 years old, it all started over 20 years ago when the Surrey Heritage Advisory Commission, also called SHAC, planted the seed for the FVHRS in 1996.

Upset at the time, with the amount of demolition permits requested for "old houses" some of the Commissioners looked for some positive heritage action options. Commissioner Jim Wallace personally funded two feasibility studies of the BCER interurban rail corridor through Surrey for heritage tourism use. Jim's cheque was presented to Mayor Doug McCallum to be used only for these studies and undertake appropriate care of this large and important heritage asset. Some on the Commission undertook the search for any original BCER Interurban cars available. Four years of reserach resulted in two reports that outlined heritage revitalization opportunities in Surrey. These were presented to Surrey Council in 2000.

Included in the reports were business case studies for Heritage Rail Tourism and the benefits to Surrey. Council approved the Heritage Tourism study and also realized that the city was not the best group to implement the plan. Surrey Council requested a non-profit group be created to carry out the plans.

In 2001 a non-profit society was created. The first members struggled for a name that reflected the history of the Interurban line. Then current SRY President, John Van der Burch, indicated that it was often referred to as "The Fraser Valley line" which resulted in our society: Fraser Valley Heritage Railway Society.

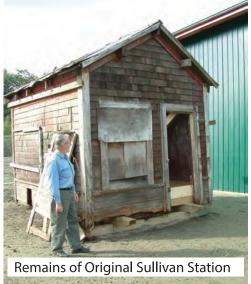

The City of Surrey provided access to undeveloped city property adjacent to Sullivan Park (152nd St & 64th Ave.) with access from 152nd Street and next to the rail right of way. Construction started on the Sullivan Car Barn in August 2003, completed in September that same year. FVHRS had no rolling stock at this time – this was really a case of 'build it and they will come!'







Funds donated by the Real Estate Foundation of B.C. allowed us to build the replica Sullivan Station, opened in 2004. We also acquired the remains of the original Sullivan Station and brought it home from a nearby farmer's field where it had been used as a chicken coop for 50 years.

The Move From Sullivan to Cloverdale







Mayor Dianne Watts indicated her desire in 2010 that we relocate to Cloverdale to become part of the future Heritage Center of Surrey. The city acquired land next to the BCER right-of-way at 176th Street. The FVHRS arranged construction of the Car Barn in 2011, by the Lark Group. The FVHRS aranged construction of the replica Cloverdale Station overlapping the site of the original Station in 2012 by Seagate Coinstruction.

Once again the cars 1225 and 1304 had to be relocated. With the help of a large GWIL crane, both interurbans were lifted onto transporters. We picked the hottest day of the year to move the cars from Sullivan to Cloverdale, and it really was "all hands on deck" to get the cars into the new barn. By the end of the very long day, the two cars were safely tucked away in their new home: The Cloverdale Car Barn, August 16, 2012.

Our grand opening saw many people on hand for the event. Mayor Watts was at the controls as 1225 came through to cut the ribbon. The "operations" are now called the Surrey Heritage Rail Experience.





We also moved the popular Speeder ride to Cloverdale. Rebuilding the passenger cart increased ridership, comfort as well as safety. We added a second cart to keep up with the demand.







BCER 961 (above and centre) is a freight locomotive, acquired in May 2014, from the Edmonton Radial Railway Museum (ERRM). The engine was used by Edmonton Power and Transit during construction of their LRT line and tunnel. The locomotive was returned to ERRM after the tunnel was opened. The storage location was no longer available and ERRM looked to find a longer term home for the freight locomotive. FVHRS plans for 961 are not yet decided. It may remain as a static exhibit. The sister locomotive 960 pictured (above right) near the Burrard Bridge in Kitsilano, is now at the West Coast Railway Museum in Squamish).

The Velocipede, our smallest piece of rolling stock, was rebuilt by Director Harry Taylor. It was originally brought in by FVHRS volunteer and member, Vince Holmes, who's neighbour had been using it as a garden ornament. Harry removed the old wood and spent the winter of 2014 recreating this masterpiece. During the work Harry connected with the European and UK based Velocipede groups and used their monthly publications and online forums for reference. In return the British group dedicated one whole issue to Harry's work.

Miss Fowlie's Yarrow Elementary Class 60 Years Later-

In 1955, a group of school children were the last 'official' passengers on 1304, a special ride from Chilliwack to Yarrow for a Grade three class. We have some grainey black and white pictures of the ride in our history display in the Carbarn.

During a tour, Director, Hugh Parkinson, wondered where the students were now. A voice belonging to Elsie Geisbrecht piped up and said, "I went to that school and I know some of them." This connection lead to forming a planning committee, resulting in the 60th Anniversary Reunion around and about BCER 1304 in 2015.

Car 1207 Joins the Cloverdale Fleet -



At 3:15 am, Thursday, January 28, 2016, after about an hour's travel time, the convoy carrying BCER 1207 arrived, from it's former home in Vancouver.

Despite heavy rain and gusty winds, the car was delivered to the 176th Ave door of the Cloverdale Car Barn. Lowering the end of PNR Railworks' special transporter, the trackmobile then pulled the car into the barn. Terry Nichols (I) and Sten Christiansen (r) helping.

A large crew of volunteers were awaiting the arrival to assist as necessary, while the benefactors, Byron and Diane Cole happily watched the transfer.





While the front-end loader coupled with 1207, FVHR's Hugh Parkinson and Ray Crowther stood with car owners, Byron and Diane Cole, who have gifted the car to the Fraser Valley Heritage Railway Society.







As the daylight increased, 1207 slowly made it's way from the former Downtown Heritage Rail barn in Vancouver and onto the railcar transporter.







When loaded onto the transporter, 1207 was secured for travel early the next morning to avoid traffic. Appreciation was also expressed to the staff of the City of Vanvouver

1304: Update by Ray Crowther



The volunteer team working on the BCER 1304 restoration during this past year have made considerable progress.

All the window frames are now reinstalled having been removed, repaired, refinished and re-glazed with safety glass. The interior electrical rewiring has been completed. The seat frames have been removed, repaired and refinished and are ready to be re-installed. The seats have been reupholstered. Our members generously donated to make the new seat upholstery possibly.

The controllers located in the vestibules have been refurbished and are ready to be reinstalled.

Below the floor boards, the steel beams under both vestibules which were severely rusted through, have been replaced. The under floor wiring and electrical components are still to be completed.

The trucks have been removed. The traction motors have been refurbished.

The FVHRS skilled volunteers are currently dissembling the trucks on site, identifying the pieces that need to be replaced or refurbished. Large items such as re-profiling of the wheels will be undertaken by a specialized machine shop. The leaf and coil springs have been removed and will be sent off for testing. The plan is to sand blast all the truck components, and carefully examine each piece for structural integrity. Non- destructive x-ray testing of the wheel axels will be carried out. Work on the axel re-assembly will include a decision on whether to replace the original Babbit bearings or retro- fit with roller bearings. As with all things, there are pros and cons. Needless to say, the process of disassembly has revealed worn areas of many components, some can be repaired, others will need to be replaced. Every piece of the truck assembly is being carefully tagged, so the parts can be re-assembled in the same sequence as they were removed. A photographic record of the truck work is being carried out to document the refurbishment process. A picture being worth a thousand words.

The next 8 months will be very busy, we will have the seat installation complete, the trucks refurbished and preparations made to lower the body of 1304 back down to the trucks, reconnections of the brakes and electrical wiring.



Clayburn Signal Building: Update by Ray Crowther



The Clayburn manually operated signal building, one of the last in the country, served many years at the diamond crossing in Clayburn to ensure safe crossing by BCER and CP Rail. No longer required, was donated by Southern Railway of BC to the FVHRS. This is truly an important piece of BCER history and an important artifact. We are fortunate to have this building.

Following relocation to the FVHRS Cloverdale compound, work started on the restoration and this is well underway.

- The roof timbers have been replaced having become rotted.
- The exterior siding has been replaced and the window and door frames replaced.

The plan is to have the Clayburn Signal building complete and operational to demonstrate the levers that activate the signal semaphores. We expect to have the signal building complete by mid 2017. This artifact will be unique and a delight to see when operational.

As with all FVHRS restoration/ refurbishment projects, every effort is made to keep as much of the original structure as possible.

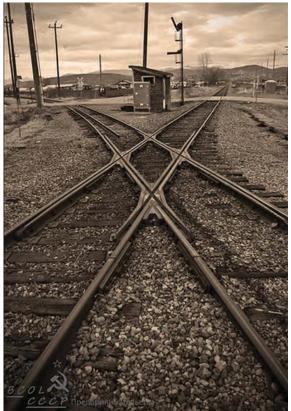
We launched a \$5,000 membership fundraising drive to complete the Clayburn signal building and we have reached the 80% mark of that campaign.

March 5, 2016, sixteen volunteers spent a very full day at the Car Barn taking First Aid training in order to be prepared to offer assistance to any of our patrons who may suffer medical distress while visiting the Heritage Rail facility or while riding BCER 1225.

Visitors to Surrey's Heritage Rail can

feel secure in the knowledge that many of the volunteers at the station, as well as many on the train crew, are equipped with current certification in Occupational Frist Aid Level 1, and training in CPR (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation). At the same time, the volunteers were trained and certified in the use of the Automated External Defibrillator (AED).

The AED has vastly improved the chances of a positive outcome in the event of cardiac arrest.

Our AED is kept in a standby mode in the Car Barn, however, when Car 1225 is in operation, the AED is aboard the train. Visitors to the site are within easy access by emergency services but the train, travelling back and forth to Sullivan Station, may not be, so as additional security, the AED travels with it.

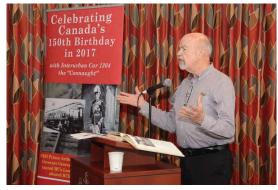

Strategic Planning 2016 ~ 2021-

Strategic Plan 2016: Facilitated by founding board member, Terry Lyster and Chair John Sprung

- 1. Continue to ENHANCE THE VISITOR EXPERIENCE by making additional cars operational with new, improved and evolving ancillary mechanisms and events. This includes further emphasis on the curatorial function and heritage messaging of the museum.
- 2. Continue to REFINE OPERATIONS including emphasis on safety, integration of procedural guides and volunteer recruiting & management throughout the organization.
- 3. Continue to BUILD RELATIONSHIPS with the City of Surrey, regulatory authorities, track & right-of-way owners, and heritage & community partners.
- 4. ADD ASSETS THOUGHTFULLY, maintaining a clear vision of how additional rolling stock, greater range and related improvements enhance the experience and fit within available skills, volunteer time and resources (financial, in-kind).
- 5. ENJOY ACCOMPLISHMENTS to date while harnessing enthusiasm for fresh initiatives. Continue to celebrate and honour contributions by volunteers and other providers. Publicize landmarks and improvements.
- 6. EXPAND PRUDENTLY: Expanding the run from Cloverdale to Newton is probably the operational limit for a heritage ride (around 1 hour). While the prospect of linking to Light Rapid Transit there, rather than at Scott road (as in previous strategic plans) is easier to accomplish, prudence is required. Until a Newton developer willing to contribute to a "rail" theme emerges, and capital funding for a new station, track upgrades, sidings and spurs is in hand; Newton is an "excursion" not part of the operation. Resolution may be beyond this five-year horizon but should be maintained as part of our vision.

Societies Act Changes

Changes to the BC Societies Act, governing not-for-profit socites in BC will take effect on November 28, 2016. We will have to revise our Constitution and Bylaws to conform with the new regulations.

A committee comprised of Stephen Plant, Allen Aubert, Sten Christiansen and John Sprung will update and manage the changes to our Constitution and Bylaws. We feel that our existing documents are close to conforming, and we'll have a painless transition. Changes will require that the membership approve the new Constitution and Bylaws at the 2017 AGM. Information on the changes will be sent well before the AGM for your review so you may bring any questions to the meeting.

As we approached startup in 2013 Terry suggested a design to portray the active return and offered Interurban Again. Since completing the transition to an operating railroad, it was felt that the Society needed a new identifier and again Terry Lyster brought forward a design which dramatically speaks to what we do and who we are. It was decided that the corporate logo would remain, honouring our operational logo and name. But in light of the reality that we operate onnly in Surrey, we should focus our logo on the city of Surrey.

A Journey Through Time: our new website

The board of directors agreed we needed a better digital "front window" through which the public could see into our opertion, and easily see just what we were all about and what we had to offer anyone wanting to visit. As attractive and as easy as the webiste is to use, we aren't done. Next stages of development will include the capability for internal communication for volunteers to enable easier scheduling and communication between the directors, and the volunteers who are involved, basically in three areas: 1: Station-side which is working with passengers right up to boarding the train; 2: Trainside, handling passengers on board 1225, enjoying speeder rides, barn tours and other attractions; and 3: Restoration-side which is about the work on 1304 and 1207 and any other artifacts that we may acquire.



Another planned website improvement will be the capability of online booking for tickets to ride on Car 1225.



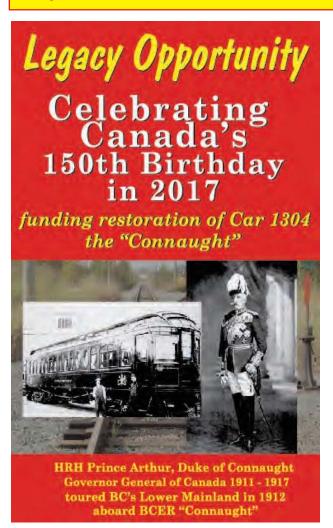
