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
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# **Entering Our Third Era**

As mentioned at the 2019 Volunteer's Appreciation Dinner, we are now entering the THIRD ERA for the FVHRS. Our FIRST era was the formation and acquisition stage where the society was still somewhat focused internally. This saw the creation of the society and initial funding, a place to exist at Sullivan Park, and erecting of a (potential) Car Barn. The growth of the society also saw this stage move from acquisition to restoration of the acquired Interurbans.

Our SECOND era was the move from restoration to Operation. This included the building of a new purpose-built facility, the move from Sullivan to Cloverdale and the start of service running the restored car (BCER 1225) as Surrey's Heritage Rail Experience (SHR).

Our THIRD era is the growth from running one Interurban, to having a System, specifically multiple cars, multiple stations (or stops) and multiple routes. We now have two operational Interurbans: BCER 1225 and BCER 1304 Connaught, multiple speeders and people powered vehicles - the 4-person hand cart and the velocipede. We also have stations at Cloverdale and Sullivan, although we are

only using one of them currently. As to multiple routes, we have our Sullivan Excursion using the SRY mainline to Sullivan, and our own Training and Event track also known as the Spur.

We have seen tremendous growth for the events that use our own track including the after-season weekend events of Halloween and Christmas. The largest growth is in our School and special events involving multiple trips or cars to run up and down the spur and may involve round trips from the Cloverdale station to the end of the spur, or depart the station to the end of the track then proceeding to the car barn (Discovery Centre) for a function, then returning to the Cloverdale station.

The next phase for the society will bring new challenges and greater opportunities. The challenges include actually getting to the next stop, which we expect will be Newton. To this end, we will be working with our partners, SRY Raillink, BC Hydro and the City of Surrey, to come to agreement on safety and other protocols to move past Sullivan.

Expanding the route will also require activation of the Sullivan Station. This is a process that involves SRY and agreement on passenger safety protocols, and lead to a more complex operational structure: for reasonable passenger time we will (eventually) look at running two cars at the same time starting from both Newton and Cloverdale. One further operational issue arising from this, will be the need for double the number of operators and station crew. We will need to invite and train more people to become part of the FVHRS family.

#### Passenger Numbers


We are a heritage train operation, offering an experience of life as it was 100 years ago as Living History. As such, we want to know how well we are doing, attracting passengers year by year. The most obvious measurement is the Passenger count. There is some distinction on what a "Passenger" is for these reports. For some of the Special Events where we offer the package of a tram ride and a tour through the Frank Horne Heritge Rail Discovery Centre, we count everyone who comes on-site. For specific routes we only count those who actually board a tram and take a ride of some type, mainly for the Sullivan Excursion. The Sullivan Excursion numbers have increased over last year. Looking at the different areas, this past year saw increases in the City's Door's Open event (many more people came by and took the Discovery Centre tour) and the Electric Express Christmas event was not only way up, it was over-sold!

School tour numbers are expected to be higher than previously reported when 2020 the spring term bookings start. We made a few changes this past year for school tours, including a slight fee increase. These tours are becoming a big draw item for new passengers. Other In-Season special events included the Heritage Rail Association conference, the Cloverdale Chamber of Commerce luncheon and the first of an annual celebration for First Responders.





And while not 'passengers' as such, we did have a very large increase in other visitor numbers to view our demonstration Honeybee hives. Our Partner, The Honeybee Centre, actually added a second hive to keep up with the action. The most impressive numbers were those of honey production! Although the beekeepers didn't keep records on each hive, by observation they all said that the

Cloverdale Station wildflower meadow hives were out-producing all the other city park demonstration hives.

#### Retail items

We added some new items to the store this year. Director and Station Master David Hobson wrote a children's book, *Pieter, Daisy and The Milk Train*, and provided copies for sale in the station. New buttons were added to the counter offerings. At the end of the season the anticipated *Railway Socks* were added and are expected to 'pull up' sales in the coming season.

Two often-asked-for items were added during the year: a Gift Card can be purchased to provide a ride for someone else – available for purchase at the station as the category of ticket needs to be punched, and paid for. The other requested item is a Seasons Pass. this is also only for sale at the station and must be purchased for a particular ticket class. The cost is about twice the value for one ride and thus means the 'third' and following rides are 'free.' This pass allows unlimited rides for one season only and is in line with what other tourist railway operators provide.

#### Marketing

The society has stepped up the joint marketing efforts with the Museum of Surrey (MoS), the Arts Council of Surrey (ACS) and the Honeybee Centre. We also continue to work with the Cloverdale Chamber of Commerce to create awareness, not only of the SHR within Cloverdale, but also to promote the Cloverdale Heritage district.

We now have a presence at MoS on a regular basis by participating in the School District's "Professional Day" events at the museum. The society also participated in the new Christmas Tree Festival, a partnership between the MoS and the Cloverdale Chamber of Commerce (see page 23) with a quickly gathered-group who decorated one of the 25 trees in the main hall. We understand this will be a recurring event so we will be looking for some new tree ornaments next season.

The major event with ACS is the Paint the Train (PtT) visual arts competition (see Page 10). This past year, the second annual event attracted more artists and submissions, as well as increased attendance at the awards reception. This year saw the first Peoples Choice Award pictured at the right of the page. We are working with the ACS to expand the third annual competition.

Having the hard-working honeybees in the meadow also meant that we were invited to have a booth at the annual Honeybee Festival. This was a great time to promote the connection to the other side of Cloverdale and our wildflower meadow.

Working with the Cloverdale Chamber of Commerce, we continued to have a float in the two major parades this year: the Rodeo and Christmas. As we now have a great float



to show off, we made an appearance in the White Rock Sea Festival parade. If you are interested in being a part of the parade crew, do get in touch with us.

# **Operations Report**

#### Dave King, Director (Operations)

2019's Operating Season was impacted by a number of construction projects on the mainline, which adversely affected our excursion schedule to Sullivan and back. On a number of occasions, road works at 168th Street and #10 Highway put the train signals out of action requiring our Conductor to get off the car and use the STOP sign, a tricky operation which had to be timed carefully. Also, reconstruction of the Serpentine River Bridge affected the crossing signals on Highway 10. Fortunately, Southern Railway loaned us a special radio to operate the crossing gates remotely. Hopefully, next year's operations will not be affected.

On a positive note, car 1304 made its inaugural run to Sullivan and back, on August 3rd, followed by several subsequent trips. This allowed our Operators to become familiar with the vehicle's characteristics, which are different to 1225. In addition, 1304 made several trips along the spur as "Speeder" trips.

Speeder 2 - the yellow unit - was activated during the summer while Speeder 1 - the red unit - is overhauled and repainted. Speeder 2 is a more powerful unit, and features a 4-speed transmission - in contrast to Speeder 1's automatic transmission. Speeder 2 is popular with Operators!



Despite the operational hiccups, we carried over 4,600 passengers on our excursions to Sullivan, which is about 38% of our capacity. On our best weekend, August 24/25, which was overcast on both days, we carried 318 passengers. Both our opening weekend and final weekend were well attended, carrying 272 and 295 passengers respectively. Our 11:15 and 12:30 runs seemed to be the most popular, by a small margin.

# Christmas in Evergreen - Tidings of Joy

The first thing we see is a multi-car train snaking its way around mountains in winter. The next scene is of people inside the car - hey - wait a minute - that's Car 1225, pulling into the station in mythical Evergreen Vermont.

The car pulls to a stop at the platform. It's Cloverdale Station with a name change (Evergreen), and the train car we see comes to a stop, with the gold numbers, 1225, filling the screen. Another interior train shot is 1304 the Connaught.

This feel-good formula Christmas season movie does a good job, and for those in the know, it gives one a good feeling to see our interurbans do well used. But wait! As the train arrives passengers with luggage are helped off the train while others have their tickets checked. The two trainmen are none other than Terry Nichols and Ray Crowther.

"It was a terrific experience," said Nichols. "We were supposed to be there to drive the car into the scene, and help where we could. We had a meeting with some of the crew led by the Assitant Director, and they asked what we could do for them, and in turn, we ended up in the film."

"The day of the shoot, September 5th, was a summerlike twenty-seven degrees. For snow, the crew bought a truck-load of ice chips from a local fish plant, and whenever there was a break in the action, two crew would appear with a plastic wheel-barrow full of "snow" to place around the edges of the wet platform to make it appear as a salted surface in winter."

"I must say the crew was terrific to work with. We were even invited to sit in the studio to "watch how the magic was done" as they referred to it."



# What's That Buzz? by Allen Aubert

2019 saw the wildflower meadow at the Cloverdale station in full bloom again, plus the addition of a beehive and bee hotel. This was our second year of wildflowers and included, for the first time, an excellent display of purple lupins that the bees were keen to explore.

The FVHRS is partnering with the Honey Bee Centre of Surrey, and every few weeks a beekeeper from the Centre came to check out our hive and make sure the bees were happy. Not only were 'our' bees very happy but they were producing a great deal of honey. They obviously liked the idea of exiting the hive and finding food just seconds away. Apparently we had over 100,000 bees in our hive during the summer.

Harry Taylor designed and constructed our unique bee hotel that is positioned near our pathway so visitors can observe the bees checking out the hotel rooms, making a selection and then leaving by blocking up the entrance with a mud type substance. There are almost 40 bees in the hotel enjoying a winter rest.

Specifically, bee hotels target solitary bees that live independently of other individuals and that nest in above-ground cavities. Solitary bees provide essential pollinating services for plants that produce many of our fruits, vegetables and flowers. The mud "doors" in the hotel mean a female bee has laid an egg inside. After the bee hatches, it will eat a supply of pollen until it is ready to break through the mud and fly away.



Our Discovery Centre guided tours included a popular stop at the wild flower meadow when our visitors were introduced to the importance of this initiative that supports the sustainability of our bee population and pollination.



This year significant improvements were made to our Discovery Centre Tour which now begins at the Wildflower Meadow about 10 minutes before the next train departure. From there the guests load onto the speeder and follow the train down the spur track. As the train reverses direction and travels west on the main line the speeder passengers can wave at the car as it goes by. A fun new experience, particularly good for picture-taking.

We have also added the new Quad Handcar to the tour attractions. The Quad has become a very

popular additional ride along with the Velocipede and Speeder.

Each Discovery Centre tour is completed before the arrival of the next train.

And now for something really special, starting the 2020 season, guests will be able to have another hands-on experience by visiting the newly commissioned Signal Shack (see Page 19) where they can actually operate the remotely located railway signals, or semaphores.

### Clayburn Signals Installed



The Clayburn Diamond Signals, situated where the BCER line crossed the CPR tracks in the Clayburn area of Abbotsford, was one of the last manually operated crossing signals in operation in North America.

The signal shack and semaphore signals were donated by SRY In 2012. It was about a year before space was created and restoration could begin. The roof had to be replaced and shingles for siding, that matched the original material, had to be located.

Once the shack was rebuilt and the switch levers were cleaned, a new base for the shack came next. The levers were placed in the foundation and a Hiab, courtesy of Kingston Construction, placed the building on its new foundation. Finally the connecting rods were installed and the semaphores became fully operational. Another terrific hands-on feature for our guests to explore.

In memory of Barry Turriff, his wife and daughter, on behalf of the family, gave a cheque to John Sprung towards the restoration of the Clayburn Shack (photo at right side).







#### **1231 Truck and Motor Removal For Restoration**

The first thing to be done after lifting the body was to remove all of the brake rigging and loosen the bolts holding the motors to the frame. The trucks were then pushed outside and the gear cases removed. It was dirty work as there was lots of heavy oil and grease in the gear cases.

A scaffold with beams was set up to lift the motors which weigh approximately 3500 lbs each. To properly remove the motors from the trucks, two chain hoists were necessary, not only to remove them, but to fix them on to pallets for shipping to the motor shop.






# The Electric Express


